MEET YOUR SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS



Your Prescott Police Department has two School Resource Officers (SROs) assigned to our local schools. SRO Lovan reports to Mile High Middle School (left) and SRO Holmes reports to Prescott High School (right). These assignments require a special temperament, patience, common sense, tactical knowledge, and sound decision-making. Not every officer is cut out for SRO work and this assignment can be one of the most challenging in police work.

Each officer is unique and offers different insights, experiences, and personality into his assignment which is a great benefit for the school, district, students, and parents. Both officers are committed to doing their best to promote safety, security, relationships, and teamwork on campus. They both value time spent on mentoring and problem solving to better their environments.

SLAM THE SCAM



Tax season is upon us, so that means scammer season is in full swing as well. Scammers continue to impersonate government or company employees in an attempt to obtain your personal information or money. They may say there's a problem or promise a prize. These criminals will apply pressure for you to act immediately and insist that you pay in a hard to trace manner, such as a gift card, prepaid debit card, cryptocurrency, wire transfer, money transfer, or by mailing cash.

How to avoid a scam:

- · Remain calm and talk to someone you trust.
- Hang up or ignore the message. DO NOT click on links or attachments in your emails or text messages.
- Protect your personal information. Be skeptical of a contact that you didn't initiate. Never
 provide your full social security number or bank account numbers.

Remember:

- You are in control of the conversation. Don't let them intimidate you or scare you. Just hang up the phone.
- Government agencies won't call, email, or text you and ask for money or personal information. Only a scammer will do that.

ALL IF YOU CAN


Your Prescott Regional Communications Center (PRCC) now integrated texting into its 9-1-1 answering system, allowing residents in need of emergency services to reach a dispatcher via text when calling is not an option.

Traditional 9-1-1 voice calls are still preferred since they are the most effective way for dispatchers to gather information and field emergency calls. Text to 9-1-1 helps those who are unable to speak due to an emergency, or for those who are deaf, hard of hearing, or speech disabled.

Here's how it works:

- If a citizen needs help but is unable to speak, or they cannot do so safely they can text
 9-1-1 using their mobile phone.
- To initiate a text to 911, all you have to do is enter 911 in the "To" field and enter the location and nature of the emergency in the text field.
- It is important to know the limitations to the system, such as: KNOW AND PROVIDE YOUR LOCATION! The most important piece of information is to provide your location, followed by what is happening.
- You can't text 9-1-1 with a non-activated phone.
- · A text from an internet messaging program will not work for 911.
- The preferred language for text is English due to limited translation services.

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ANIMAL CONTROL

Hello, Prescott! Who is ready for spring? Springtime is just around the corner along with an array of baby animals. Please remember, as you start to enjoy outdoor activities and our beautiful trails, be aware of our young wildlife.

Soon you may see young raptors who are growing and learning to use their wings, also known as fledglings. They will spend a lot of time perched on the edge of their nest or higher branches of the trees. Oftentimes with big wind gusts they can find themselves on the ground. As tempting as it may be to help them, it is



important to leave them alone as this is a part of their learning process. If you find a fledgling on a road or a path, they will often try to act scary and open their wings and make noise to try to intimidate you because they cannot fly away on their own yet. If you pick it up and remove it from the area the baby may not have a great future. What you may not see is that their parents will still be close by and continue to feed the fledgling until it can make its way to safety.









We also have young mammals in the area that could find their way on trails or hide in plain sight, fawns are notorious for this. Animal control often receives phone calls regarding injured fawns however, the fawn is tucked away in hiding while the mom is foraging for food. Baby skunks and baby raccoons spend their time trying to keep up with mom and may become separated for a short time while they find a resting spot. It's important to keep an eye out for these little trail hazards. If you are concerned about abandoned baby wildlife, please let them be and contact Arizona Game and Fish (623-236-7201) or Prescott Police Animal Control (928-445-3131). We will do what we can to ensure the best decisions are made for the youngsters and get them to safety.
